These recordings were taken by an anonymous source inside of Patriot Front during August to December 2021. Unicorn Riot has produced transcript PDFs, MP3s and videos from this set of recordings. The transcripts and the Mp3s use the same set of timecodes. The main report on our website uses separate timecodes that match our videos, which are lightly edited to remove silence, with an additional introduction and credits.

The .mp3 files (as opposed to slightly shortened videos) represent the uncut documentation of these Patriot Front voice meetings. These uncut audio files have been altered as little as possible in the interests of source protection.

Accuracy of transcripts and speaker identities

Unicorn Riot has done our best to compile transcripts with the most accurate time stamps and speaker identifications possible. Due to the combination of machine transcription and extensive human labor, there may be occasional errors in speaker IDs indicated in transcripts. but we are confident that the vast majority of the speaker IDs and content are correct. Some transcript timestamps are incorrect due to unavoidable issues with using machine transcription at scale, however, the majority are accurate.

Please note that these recordings may include Patriot Front members whose voices were not identified by us. When we were unsure about a speaker's identity we have left that line in the transcript without an assigned name, which machine transcription services usually tag as 'Unknown'. Many Patriot Front members have been identified by researchers, activists and journalists by linking multiple pieces of evidence to online personas.

So I put some of our, um, promat stuff up there. And then I stickered in um, you know, just some of the areas around the park like the light poles and whatnot. And then on the weekend, uh, went up to, uh, went up to western part of North Carolina with the fellas. We did the interview with Jesse. So that's when we interviewed him. Really great guy. And then we, uh, we did a couple banner drops, we did some stickering, we actually found a functional payphone, uh, where we were at that we made sure to put a Patriot Front sticker on. So shout out to um, Patrick for that, and yeah, that was, we did some stenciling, and that was pretty much it. It was a very successful um, very successful trip where we went, I don't know if I'm allowed to say the specific city. But it is a uh, antifa stronghold on the east coast. So we were very happy to be able to pull it off. We, safety was like the number one priority. It's a very hostile environment, uh, with the antifa crowd that's up there. So we did really, really well, timed everything great, uh. Marcus did a really good job organizing sort of the itinerary for that night, uh. So it couldn't have been any better. It was so successful. I think we're all dying to go back there again, um, as soon as possible. And I think it's actually scheduled in the coming weeks for us to go hit up that same, uh, city so that we can begin countering some of that antifa, uh, propaganda going on up there. Hey, what's going on?

So, uh, as, uh, Alan Michigan and Eric Michigan and Benjamin Michigan were saying, uh. We were, uh, uh, doing, uh, a few sticker run and stenciling stuff, um, this past weekend. Um. And, uh, um, I'm trying to get back into it more because I've been kind of, kind of getting rusty getting away from, um, uh, some of the like, my kind of local stuff we do. I always, I'm always excited to go to the big activist events but I, I have trouble fighting the, uh, blackpill fever. And so I, uh, I have a, a, I've been trying to kind of get over that and get back into the local, um, uh, activism. Uh, obviously looking forward to the, uh, particular, uh, big event we got planned, um. How's it going everybody? About two weeks ago, I did the Midwest hike that was organized by Carter Missouri. We had a pretty good turnout. We had a bunch of Illinois guys and some Arkansas guys, we had some Colorado guys. We even had a guy who drove all the way down from Minnesota, all the way through, that was pretty impressive. And he drove all the way back. Like Carter was saying, the, the weather was much rougher than we anticipated. But ultimately it ended up being kind of fun, we, we got to push ourselves pretty hard. And I think it was a good character building experience for all of us. And then last weekend, I went and interviewed somebody with Carter. I also just finished an interview with the pool parties in the area, trying to get involved and see if I can [inaudible] a few more people out [inaudible] activism and see who's around the area. So I met some of them at the NJP event and we talked about, you know, the possibility of doing some networking sometime in the future anyway. Whether this would be fruitful or not is yet to be seen. I'm confident I did well in my interview, so. Yeah that's what I'm up to.

Okay, yeah, um, activism from the last meeting, I'm not sure if I went on a sticker run or not. I know I was focusing on getting my cardio in for the hike [inaudible] that we did. And before I get to that, I guess I'd say activism for the future, I'll see what the gasoline kind of situation is here, because it's a little scarce now. I have my power back today. And I think a lot more people are getting their power back in the area that I live in. So it should become more available. And I might be making trips down to more like southern Louisiana to help out with my family and the local communities. So I might be able to get some sticker runs and stuff in, I'll try and bring it with me as I'm driving and maybe stop in some towns to place some stickers. But as far as the hike went, I thought my cardio and everything would be good enough. But it could have definitely used some more work or maybe it's because I'm used to like a negative six feet altitude. I was able to make it but I would say barely, so probably need some, some more fitness or I probably need to work on my cardio a little bit more. But that is probably one of the most difficult hikes we could have done. And it was my first hike and I made it, so. I had been invited to the [inaudible], I'm not sure that I can go now, I guess it would depend on what the kind of storm restoration stuff, what's going to happen with that. So, I can't [inaudible], I know Jesse Arkansas really wanted me to go but I'll have to get back to him.

We're looking forward to seeing you again, if it's not in a few weeks then a little bit after that we'll work something out. All right, Marcus Washington.

Since last meeting, I have done seven sticker runs, one banner. And I went on the Mount Rainier hike. It was excellent.

Tell me something excellent about the hike.

Alex Oregon's cooking.

There we go. What was the meal? Give me the details.

We had some cowboy cooking, some sort of steak, eggs, sausage in a tortilla concoction.

Man, I'm hungry already. That sounds wonderful. There you go. Not quite steak, almost. Well, very good. Very good. I hope, I hope it was bearable. Alright, Michael Indiana.

Michael IN 12:28

Since the last meeting, I've been on two sticker runs, and I'm going up to Gerard, Indiana, and Lafayette and we did the George Floyd mural, which was kind of, kind of bittersweet, it got sprayed off about an hour after we did it, or pretty shortly after we did it. But it's making a pretty big, we hit a hornet's nest, basically, but talking to the Michigan guys about doing something later, later this month. I think that's it for now.

Since our last meeting, I think I've done two sticker runs, about two hikes and done at least two interviews along with Carter Missouri.

Talk a little bit about your experience on the hike. Yeah, go. Go ahead.

Randolph IL (Garret Garland) 16:42

Yeah, the Midwest hike was like Kyle said, a good character and bond building experience, especially with the monsoon we had. But I'd say Carter's chili at the end made it all worth it. And the Colorado hike, all I'll say about that is if you're not used to high altitude, definitely, maybe try to bring some oxygen with you. We could've used more of that. But otherwise, if you find yourself hungry on top of a mountain, don't try to eat a can of soup, just stick with a protein bar or something.

If I show up on the day of the fourth and realize it's not a food run and you technically used code language, does that mean you have to suspend yourself for an allotted time?

Thomas Rousseau 24:19

Negative, it doesn't, because there is going to be some amount of peaches delivered. No matter what, no matter what. Alright, comments, questions, concerns, suggestions, ideas.

Sean KS 24:32

I had a comment.

Thomas Rousseau 24:34

Okay, go ahead.

Sean KS 24:35

Or a suggestion. We actually had some copies of your pamphlet at the, at the Midwest hike, which we read from, and they were quite inspiring us, I think in particular that bit about integrity instead of optics. And it seems to me that given the current situation, there might be a, it might be ideal to, as the word, take attack in a new promat direction to more accurately and directly address the issues which are facing the nation.

Thomas Rousseau 25:15

So, the perspective of our slogans in graphics on the promotional materials are meant to be short, recognizable, immediately rememberable. And they're also meant to be consistent. And the point of the pieces of promotional material is to advertise the organization's location, and also basic ideas about its beliefs. And that is done with each of the slogans that represent one of our core ideals. And the wonderful things about our promotional material is they are so timeless and consistent. We do not need to change them out. Whenever things about political nature changes, which makes our message more robust. It makes it more consistent, and an assumption that our message is the way it is because we are afraid of being called nasty names, or because we're worried that someone might say Jew this or Jew that, is incorrect, our message is built with a very conscious intent to have the content that it does. Is there anything else I can help explain about this? I

Sean KS 26:44

I think that explains your position quite well.

Thomas Rousseau 26:52

Is, are there any other thoughts you have on this topic?

Sean KS 26:56

Well, that, I happen to know, quite a lot of [inaudible], we're working on building out the Kansas region further, I happen to know a lot of people who have a poor perception of Patriot Front on account of that. If you follow what I mean.

Thomas Rousseau 27:07

What do you mean by that? I don't know what you mean. What do you mean by that?

Sean KS 27:12

People, I know a lot of them, some of them are good friends of mine, who think the Patriot Front is just groypers with better graphic design. And I say that advisedly. But I know people who think like that, and people who would otherwise make great members, but don't think Patriot Front is a good organization.

Thomas Rousseau 27:29

Can they think of that after, you know, reading the manifesto, listening to the speeches perusing the website, they do all that and they still think that we're just Trump supporters?

Sean KS 27:46

I didn't say Trump supporters, but they think, I suppose they have a certain, they perceive it as being reactionary, and moderate. And not a revolutionary patriotic organization which recognizes who our enemies are and what, that they ought to be opposed.

Thomas Rousseau 28:10

Gotcha. So specifically, we use the word revolutionary quite, quite frequently in our speeches and such. So is this just because our stuff doesn't talk about like Jews or black people like directly like, or like by name? Isn't that what they're talking about? If it is, like, it's fine, you can say that, I'm not gonna be offended.

Sean KS 28:31

Well, that's exactly the point. And that does suggest certainly, you know, if it was a different organization, like let's say, take, uh, well, yeah, that's the long and short of it is people who otherwise would be, would approve of Patriot Front, don't, because of that exact reason. They perceive it as being optical, if you like.

Thomas Rousseau 28:53

Here's the thing, right? Our message is about two primary things. One, ourselves, and the group, we seek to make our target demographic, both in ideal and logistical function, which is the nation, and then it is our moral stances and convictions which outline that demographic, and also what we deem as good and bad, right? And the wonderful thing about our more universal moral fixture is that if I say doing X is bad, it is bad if a Jew does it, and it is bad if a non-Jew does it. So if they want to find out if I think that a Jew was bad for doing X, they just have to find out if I think X is bad, because we do not morally exempt Jews or blacks or transgender people or cops or whoever, from doing something based on their status, because we have a stringent rigid moral fixture to our message. And in terms of our manifesto and our message, we don't state all of these things verbatim. Because at once it is not necessary due to our universal moral fixture. But at once, it is also important, because our message is not chiefly about them. Everyone talks about black people, and everyone talks about gay people. And everyone talks about these imagined, you know, oppressed, downtrodden, impoverished, you know, however much validity there may be to that, in any circumstance, everybody's talking about everybody who isn't us. And if we turn our gaze and start talking about everybody who isn't us, we are adding to that trend. And we lose sight of the positive aspects which we are chiefly capable of organizing around. It is very difficult for us to tangibly impact the grand efforts of massive countrywide or global institutions, not saying we do not wish to and not saying we don't. But that is a scale beyond our current logistical capabilities. However, that isn't, that is in the, the negative the oppositional sense, which is, of course, morally justified, where it is applicable. But in the positive sense, we have a great deal of easily accessible opportunity in organizing around those who are willing, who are able to be improved, to be worked with and to be mobilized and made active. So that is why a lot of our message, nearly all of it, revolves around us and who we are, because everyone else is already everyone else, and they know who they are. But we want to show people who we are, and what we believe. And we take this stringent moral fixture, and it is a lens through which you can look at the entire world. So I don't need to lay out X is wrong for XYZ people, I can just lay out X is wrong. And you can apply it to YZ people, if it is applicable to them. Does that help?

Sean KS 32:30

It helps explain your position very well. And it was very carefully worded.

Thomas Rousseau 32:35

Well, it's what I believe, so.

ND - Lawrence FL 32:37

Sorry to interrupt. Daniel Georgia needs verification.

Thomas Rousseau 32:40

Oh, sure. One moment. All right. Daniel is verified. What was that Lawrence?

ND - Lawrence FL 32:48

I guess we were on this topic, another good question to bring up is like, you know, sometimes, um, I know myself in the past, I was like this too, less so now because I think I understand how and why we do things a bit better. But um, you know, sometimes I think people get, it's also a little related to the, Mr. whoever it was, Sean Kansas was saying, maybe I'm, maybe I'm wrong. But sometimes people when they, you know, when we say we're revolutionary, they don't see, oh they're not actively planning Turner Diaries, you know, type activities, or they aren't explicitly saying, yes, we're going to be like the Turner Diaries. And so because of that reason, well, we're not, exactly but because that reason it's like, well, we how could it be revolutionary. How could, how can you be revolutionary organization if [inaudible]

Thomas Rousseau 33:37

Revolution is a principle, not a tactic.

ND - Lawrence FL 33:41

Well, there you go. That answers the question.

ND - Carter MO (Luke Paule) 33:43

I'd like to, uh, say something.

Thomas Rousseau 33:46

Who's this? Graham? Sounds like Graham. Carter? Sorry. Go ahead.

ND - Carter MO (Luke Paule) 33:49

Yeah. Sean, you know, if your friends were at Philadelphia, you would have no doubt about what we are.

Thomas Rousseau 33:57

Yeah, and, you know, another big thing is, because of the movement dynamic, a lot of these people have been very included or immersed in it for a very long time. And there's a, there's sometimes some misplaced priority, because people aren't used to an organization like ours, we are certainly unconventional in our function and in our, you know, method of operation. And a lot of people are used

to how organizations maybe used operate in the 90s, you know, where a lot of like the, you know, the foundational, you know, kind of white nationalist lingo and, and, you know, proto-memes, if you want to call it that, were settled. But we are a very new generation of operation, and people sometimes place in the sense of optics, you know, are almost arguing in on the other side of optics, but still kind of a part of the same you know, as part of the same disinterest, will prioritize the existence of certain phrases or buzzwords over the actual presence of the proper ideals or convictions, where someone might not be explaining something exactly like you are familiar with, so you don't like them, but they actually have the correct beliefs and a proper moral mindset. So we don't use the language that a lot of people use, we have our own revolutionary dialogue. And we have our rules for our message that we stick to, because having rules about our beliefs and their presentation over a pretty long period of time now, and those being consistent, lends us credibility. Because the last thing people want in an organization is something which appears to be unstable or shifting. So obviously, that is not the case. But nobody's accusing us of that, at least not in in this context. So that should also be known that because we don't use certain, you know, buzzwords, or call out certain specific things, whether that's using certain phrases, or names of groups, or individuals, or even slurs, right, doesn't actually mean that we don't have certain moral fixtures, it might mean in some cases, depending on the phrase, but our message is unique. And sometimes people are not used to that. But if they are of an open mind, which of course anybody with these beliefs should be, because that's how you get there, they should really look at what we say, and more so what we do, and they should really make an honest judgment about us in our own right, and not necessarily in comparison to anything else, or anyone else. So that's what I would say, any final topics on this before we move on?

Alan MI 36:57

If I could add to that, because I've had this discussion with other people. And I've seen this criticism of PF. And I think that, um, maybe 10% of the time, this criticism is made, it's actually made in good faith. And I think that 10% of the time, it's useful to address it, but 90% of the time, in my experience, it's an excuse or cope for not being involved. But when it comes to that 10% of the time where it is a genuine like, concern, I think that there's two main avenues to responding to it. And the first one, as Thomas alluded to earlier, they need to watch the videos, they need to read the manifesto, and kind of pay attention when watching the videos to the speeches being made, because that will articulate the position beyond just, we're America, patriots, or whatever, more extensively. As well as, the second point is that, um, many people in the movement will make this assumption that if it doesn't look like the NSDAP [inaudible], right, it's not in our interest. And that's a silly, I think it's a good thing to make the point that fascism displays itself or manifests itself in different ways in different nations, and therefore the American nation's representation of its national interests might be different than other [inaudible] Germans, and that's fine. And that doesn't invalidate either of the ways of doing it. I think that's a good thing to point to make.

Thomas Rousseau 38:14

Interesting, interesting, interesting comments. Was that Alan?

Alan MI 38:19

Uh yes, that was me.

Thomas Rousseau 38:20

Cool. Alan. Alright. Go ahead, Sean.

Sean KS 38:22

So I suppose yeah, I should just tell my friends, I suppose that Patriot Front is opposed to Jewish control of the United States, we're just not big on talking about it much.

Thomas Rousseau 38:33

That's not even necessarily, uh, correct. So obviously, I am opposed to control of the United States where it is against our national interest. And yeah, Jews are definitely involved in, you know, institutions and government. And they definitely, you know, a lot of the, a lot of the people doing things that I'm very much morally against are Jewish. And in some cases, that might be a coincidence, in another case, it's probably not. And I've actually spoken about this before [inaudible] podcast, and you can send them a link. I'm sure someone can pick it up and send it to you.

I believe it was with the old NRM thing. I've heard it before.

Thomas Rousseau 39:14

Not that old in the grand scheme of things, but yeah, I mean, anytime I've ever been asked this question, I give the same answer, you know, and we openly state what we are against in regards to the existence of the United States as it stands. And if Jews are involved, if it's not like, you know, we're conservatives where we say, oh, we don't like the government, because it's doing X and someone says, oh, well, Jews are actually involved in the government, and we say, oh, my God, right, I would never. No, we don't say that. Because we place our morality above optics, right? We place our integrity before optics. So we say yes, I am still against it X, Y and Z because that is what my moral convictions demand. But we are all even less reactionary in that context. Because our morals don't change based on, you know, what kind of people are committing the actions. And certainly it is a, it's a very, very diverse country. So there's obviously lots of a whole multitude of ethnicities and ideologies, which are committing all sorts of morally detestable actions across the continent. So we should be flexible in order to appropriately judge them all morally, correctly. So yes, I am not interested in using certain, you know, phrases or messaging tactics that have been prevalent in organizations of the past, because we are describing them as organizations of the past, they are not with us anymore. And I believe they are not with us anymore, due to one of many reasons, that their messaging was oppositional moreso than it was positive, their messaging took a very opportunistic space and turned it into something to be given to those who detest us and those who oppose us, as opposed to perhaps those who seek our interests, those who seek to build and to improve as we do. So that's what I say. And I think we should wrap up this discussion on that note, and if anybody would like to talk to me about this anymore, they should stick around after the meeting. And I'll see if I have time, I have a few other calls lined up. But, you know, I'm usually on Mumble until nobody wants to talk to me anymore. So there we go. Moving on, comments, questions, concerns, suggestions, ideas, let's do a few more,

because that took up, a few more, because that took up a little bit longer time than they usually do. Go ahead, anybody.

Norman AL (Ian Elliott) 41:46

I've actually got an idea, this may already be kind of [inaudible] talking about like fitness standards, and so on and so forth. But something that's simultaneously a lot of fun, build a lot of brotherhood is completely applicable to stuff that we're doing. And I think it's, some of it's already kind of being designed. But if we have a system that's basically like specific goals, you know, you're a member, you should be able to run this distance and this time are our complete, you know, we just basic fitness stuff that you can have these tasks out there that are rewarded with, it could be something simple, like, like a patch, or flag or whatever it might be. But simple stuff like that can get people together, especially when there's just young men getting together and they're active. They're doing fitness, they're doing things that require fitness, and especially when we gather on hikes and whatnot, where there can be, you know, good hearted competition, to push each other further, stay healthy and stay happy about it, that sort of thing is too much fun. [Inaudible] and I'd gladly volunteer to help out in any way shape or form to organize stuff like that, and set standards that we think are applicable to the needs of the group.

Very interesting. I will keep that in mind. Absolutely. It's a great idea. All right. Anything else comments, questions, concerns, suggestions, ideas? Let's do one or two more.

Yeah, I was kind of thinking along the same lines, like he was just saying, and then, you could also have like multiple tiers like a base level standard or other standards to work up to and then I was also thinking like almost kind of like a CrossFit Games way like a Patriot Front games. I don't know. Maybe you could like, you know, yeah, you could do MMA competitions, boxing competitions, weightlifting, you know, sprinting mile run times, you know, someone could do online, obviously, fighting you'd have to do in person, but I think that would make for some good content.

You don't have to do it in person. I've seen so many people fight over the internet, you wouldn't believe.

Thomas Rousseau 43:41

No, absolutely. And these, these are ideas that, you know, no offense to you guys, they're good, but they're not necessarily the most original, we've heard these things. And definitely, I know, I'm definitely in favor of this stuff, I think this would be great. I want to incorporate a lot more fitness activities into our small group meetups and our large group meetups, these hikes are a big part of that. Because, you know, you find out a whole lot about your fitness level when you get up to about you know, 13, 14,000 feet, or when you've been hiking for, you know, over a dozen miles, right? And what we can do, or what we're planning on doing is, you know, using these big events as benchmarks to judge where

people at and we are, you know, you know, not not in a bad way but we're singling people out, you know, who have issues and need more help and we're going to be including them into a different you know, a different kind of support group for that and and there's other plans in place. But uh, you know, the, the big thing is we are making progress towards this finally, and, and it is going to be done and it's going to be done well. And definitely, once we have a fairly solid majority of the membership meeting the standards that will be in place, then we will have additional confidence in people taking their fitness into new heights, with, they can specify into different, you know, different, you know, things like whether they're martial arts or other specific skills, once they have that base level built, and we'll have a much larger pool of activists of a much more physically competent level that we can then kind of swing on at all these different competitions or local activities, challenges, rewards, initiatives, you know, etc. So, um, so definitely, I like those ideas. But you know, right now, it's just about getting everybody up to that strong, strong base level. You know, because, as you know, especially with our hike, something I emphasize, we're only as fast as the slowest guy, right? Because we got to stick together, same principle for an organization, right? When we're doing our marches, right, we don't leave anybody behind. So it's about our collective, um, fitness level. So that's, that's what we're prioritizing right now. And then we can get into the extra fun stuff. So that's, that's the, that's the dessert for after we've had our main course. Um. Anyways, comments, questions, concerns, suggestions, ideas? Let's do this next last one, go ahead Johnny.

[Inaudible] Thank you so much, uh. So what I was gonna say was, I say this all the time to my local group, um, that, I'm, I'm getting to be an old man now, going past, in my 30s. Um. And the thing is, I've been in two different, um, activist organizations, which I've watched a lot because of, of mistakes of the past, um, but, you know, go down. And the thing is, is that I'm not trying to say it's inevitable that organizations go down by any stretch of the imagination. I'm not saying that, you know, bigger political goals, which we'd like to see achieved, um, are not possible. I'm not saying anything like that. However, I am saying that, um, the most important thing that we're doing in it, those of you who are new, and those of you have been in for a while, um, the best, biggest, most important thing that we're doing is building brotherhood. And if tomorrow, um, this organization, and I'm not saying there's any reason for this to happen, but if, you know, things do happen though, and if this organization got stalled, or whatever, and the local, uh, network that you create, the people that you meet, um, in this movement, that is the most important thing that we're doing here. And everything else is just gravy, it's just extra, um, stuff on a Sunday. And the thing is, is that, you know, it would be nice to think, you know, we become PF nation, you know, over time, or this grows into something, you know, much, much bigger than it is now. And I mean, I have every intention of trying to make that a real realization, make it happen. Um. But if you let yourself get, uh, I've met too many people, um, that were, have told me like, well, you know, uh, I was gonna [inaudible] put up all kinds of stickers, and you know, [inaudible] and it's like, that's, that's not the, the, that shouldn't be your driving, uh, mission, it should be the brotherhood, it should be the camaraderie, it should be, um, the, and, and moving, working toward a bigger goal. Um. But I just wanted to say that, so. Thank you.

Sure, and, and let me, let me touch on that. So, the objective of the organization is not so stringently defined as maybe conventional parties and such where they're trying to implement policy and stuff, I

am often very critical of the phrase "the movement" in stuff like that, you hear me say it in funny voices, you hear, you see me put it in quotations, because I recognize that the most important aspect of a movement is to be going somewhere, right, is to be moving. And right now, we are an organization, right? We have rules, we have structure, we have direct, verbal initiative. But eventually, you know, obviously, the organization should persist by all our means, and by all our spirits, but what we can do and what we have every opportunity of doing, is establishing around and with the organization as the core, a movement all our own, where we can impact the lives of men, and the, we can impact the lives of men and the common dialogue and perception of culture, such that what Patriot Front is, what it believes, its motifs, its imagery, its style of conduct, and things that we exalt, the things that we idealize, grow beyond us, to those who may not even have any direct connection to the organization, but nonetheless, embody it and through that [inaudible] larger affiliation we can [inaudible].

I've been around a lot of different groups, I've been in a lot of different organizations, and it's just relentlessly positive views that people have about our group now. I know we probably get some criticism too, but just over on my end, it's been guys of all different ages that have had different backgrounds, that've had a lot of positive to say about what you, what you're doing, what what we're doing, and how things are going.

For sure, so just to finish up my point there, what we do goes beyond ourselves, and our goal is to further and uphold the organization, but also immortalize it in its impact on culture. Because, you know, historical precedent, you know, the Sons of Liberty do not exist anymore, you know, but the, you know, the, their cultural impact lasted for generations, you know, the organization is [inaudible] pool, and we should use it for as long as it is appropriate. But at the same time, we are also engaging in a battle of scope and culture that is far beyond what the organizational structure itself contains. Right. So, think about that, definitely go read 'Why Activism' again, everybody. Alright. So, thank you for that, we will wrap up the meeting now, because I have some planning calls to get some of those events that y'all and I are going to all planned out, all wonderful, to make sure that everybody's bringing their cans of peaches.
