THE COURT: Good morning. The trial is about to begin. During the trial, you are going to hear the testimony of several witnesses. You will have to make judgments about the credibility and weight of their testimony. Be patient and listen carefully to the testimony of all the witnesses. Keep it all in mind until you've heard all of the evidence.

Now evidence is what witnesses say and any exhibits received in evidence and submitted to you in the jury deliberation room is also evidence. What the attorneys say is not evidence. However, you should listen carefully to any statements the attorneys make. Those statements are made so that you can better understand the testimony.

During the trial an objection may be made to some evidence, and I may sustain or overrule the objection, and direct that a question not be asked or answered. You should not speculate about what the possible answer would have been.

If I instruct you during the trial to disregard some statement that a witness has made, then you must disregard :

There are things you should not do during the trial. I will remind you again. You are not investigators. You are not to go out and do any looking and you are not to ask people about this matter. Above all, you must not talk to anyone who is involved, the lawyers or the witnesses.

You should not discuss the case among yourselves.

At the end of the trial you will have as much time as you need to discuss it, but that's at the end and not during the trial.

When you go home during the trial, your family

and friends will be curious as to what you were doing. You may tell them you are sitting as a juror in a criminal case and that's all you should tell them.

You don't have to stay away from people or refuse to speak to them. Do whatever you wish, just don't talk about this case. And don't read about it in the newspapers or listen to news about it on radio or television.

Please make a mental note of the seat you are in and keep that seat throughout the trial.

At this time we will listen to the attorneys' opening statements. This is their opportunity to tell you what they believe the evidence will show.

MS. KEENA: Thank you, Your Honor.

Good morning. Welcome back. I would just like to take this opportunity to introduce myself again. I am Kathy Keena, Assistant Dakota County Attorney, and I represent the state in this matter.

I would like to take this opportunity to introduce you to the reason why we are all here. This is Khaled Al-Bakri. Khaled was born on March 23, 1977, in Hebron, which is just south of Jerusalem.

Khaled attended Amon University in Jordan where he earned a degree in accounting. While at the University, he served as a student body president for three years. And when

he graduated, he graduated number one academically in his class.

Khaled came to the United States in the year of '
2000 on a student visa. His brother, Tariq Bakkri, was already
here and was the owner of Sabreen's Market in South St. Paul.

Khaled lived with his brother Tariq and Tariq's wife Kate for about a year and then he moved out and got his own apartment where he lived for about a year.

While in Minnesota, Khaled was attending Century College where he was taking business classes and English classes. He had also taken a review course in preparation of taking the CPA exam, which he was scheduled to sit for in January of 2003.

Khaled was engaged to be married. His fiancée lived in Hebron, and Khaled was to return there to be wed on June 21, 2003. Unfortunately, it's a wedding that never took place because on the night of December 22, 2002, Khaled's life came to a very tragic end, for it was on that night that the defendant and his good friend, Dominic Johnson, entered Sabreen's and killed Khaled during the course of a robbery.

Khaled was shot twice in the back of his head. It was the defendant who pulled the trigger that night, ending the life of a young man with a bright, promising future.

The defendant has been indicted and is standing trial on three separate counts: Murder in the First Degree

Over the course of the next few days, the state is going to prove beyond a reasonable doubt that the defendant is guilty of committing these crimes. To do that, the state will be introducing the testimony of several witnesses. And I would like to highlight some of the witnesses' testimony with you at this time.

As I already mentioned, Tario Bakkri is the victim's brother. He's the owner of Sabreen's Market which is a neighborhood grocery story located in South St. Paul.

On December 22, 2002, Tariq had opened the store at about 8:00 in the morning and it was scheduled to remain open until 10:00 that night.

On that day, as was common for Khaled to do, he came down to see his brother at the store. He came in at about 2:00, and they had coffee and just shot the breeze

Tarig was a new father at the time, and he left the store at approximately 6:00, and Khaled agreed to work the store in his brother's absence.

Tario had kind of another sideline business and he was faxing out some letters on that evening in regards to that other business.

Tariq came back to the store at about 9:17 to fax a

2/27/2025 10:46 A letter. He left the store, and on his way home he got a phone call telling him that he needed to fax the letter to acother location. So he returned to the store and left for the last time at about 9:29

According to the last entry on the cash register tape, the till was opened at 9:35 for a no sale. That's when the robbery was occurring.

When Tariq was finally allowed to go back into the store, he determined that there were a number of items that were missing. He estimates that there was between \$625 to \$650 that was taken. He was missing a cordless phone which Khaled had a habit of carrying around in his waistband. They were missing lottery tickets, cigarettes and a number of their plastic bags that they loaded groceries into.

Kathleen Johnson had the misfortune of walking into Sabreen's through the front door at the time that the robbery was in progress. On that date she was at a friend's residence just a few blocks from Sabreen's.

At approximately 9:40, she drove to Sabreen's to buy some cigarettes. She parked on the street in front of Sabreen's which has a glass front, but she couldn't see inside because there were so many advertisements hanging in the windows

She entered the store and saw a man behind the counter emptying the cash register. She heard the man behind

the counter yell something. She couldn't quite make out what the word was, but yell something as if alerting a second person in the store.

reached for his waistband and she thought he was reaching for a gun. She ran out of the store and returned to her car.

While she was sitting in her car, she observed two men run out the front of the store, turn and run around the corner towards the back of the store. There's an alley that runs behind the store.

She described both men as having thin builds, one being approximately five-nine, the other approximately fiveseven. She described what both men were wearing, dark hooded sweatshirts, baggy, low-slung jeans, and not able to identify their faces because they both were wearing black ski masks.

and told them what happened, and they called 911.

alley, Sam and Matt Renville, who are kids, they are brother and sister, they were walking to Sabreen's with Dale Marx, who is a friend of theirs and who lives in the neighborhood. He lives right across the street from Sabreen's, as a matter of fact. Those three, along with a younger boy named Jacob, were walking to the store to get snacks. They were having a

sleepover at the Renville residence that night and knew that the store closed at 10:00 and that they needed to get themselves down there if they wanted to get there before it closed.

They were walking to Sabreen's in the alley. And as they were approaching the store, they see that there's a car parked in the alley, and that it's running. They see two males run out from between Sabreen's and a garage, run to the waiting car, yelling, "Go, go, hurry, hurry."

They described the males as swearing baggy, dark colored clothing. Samantha sees that both are wearing hoodies, which are hooded sweatshirts. Again, because they are so far away from the car, they were not able to provide a description as far as the faces of what these two men looked like.

So the kids enter Sabreen's and they don't see anybody. They know Khaled well, they go to the store often. Dale Marx helps out at the store. He works at the store every once in a while. So he is looking around the store. He's looking everywhere in the store to try to find Khaled.

As they get up to the counter, they notice that something doesn't look right about the cash register, the drawer is missing. So Dale peers over the counter and sees that Khaled has been shot.

He tells the others to run from the store. They run

You are going to hear from the person who performed the autopsy on Khaled. She was called to the scene of the crime. Her name is Dr. Lindsey Thomas. In performing the autopsy, she determines the cause of death to be as a result of two gunshot wounds to the victim's head. She determines the manner of death to be a homicide. During the autopsy she extracts both bullets from the head. It did not go through. They were still in his head.

The Minnesota Bureau of Criminal Apprehension was called to the crime scene to process it. In processing the crime scene, they found four .22 caliber cartridge casings near the victim's body behind the counter. There was one bullet found imbedded in a flashlight that was on a very low shelf behind the counter. So they had one bullet from the flashlight. They had two bullets from the head and they were never able to find the fourth bullet, which you will understand when you see the size of them. They are small.

Kurt Moline, with the BCA, examined the four cartridge casings and determined that all four were fired from the same weapon, boom, boom, boom, Two of the casings were Winchester brand and two of the casings were CCI brand. He will describe to you how -- for those of you who are not familiar with ammunition, that each cartridge has a head-

stamp on it identifying who the manufacturer is.

One of the witnesses you are going to mar from is a woman by the name of Colleen McManus. On December 22, 2002, she was employed as the night manager at the Buttery Bar, which is located in downtown St. Paul. At that point she had worked there for approximately one and-a-half years and was familiar with both Mr. Vance and his friend Dominic

Between 10:15 and 10:30 that night -- she had been at the bar at 7:00, that's when she started work. She left at about 8:15, or so, to go home and make sure that the kids were all in bed. She has older teenagers. So she is returning to the bar at 10:15, 10:30. And when she drives up, as she is driving up to the bar, she sees Mr. Vance and Mr. Johnson being dropped off.

She goes into the bar, puts her things away, and has an opportunity to talk to Mr. Vance. She notices that there is something not quite right. Mr. Vance and Mr. Johnson aren't acting their normal selves. So she talks to them, and Vance tells her that he really needs to leave town because he had really/fucked up this time.

Vance told her that he didn't mean for it to go off and that he just wanted to scare him. As he was making these comments, Mr. Vance held out his hand like he was holding a gun. At this point Colleen McManus has no idea what had

happened at Sabreen's. She has no idea what he's talking about.

She will describe to you that Mr. Vance seemed very upset and started crying when talking to her, which was very unusual for Mr. Vance.

Conversation continued and finally she asked Vance, "Did you shoot someone?"

Vance's reply was "Yeah, I did."

Between 11:00 and 11:15, Vance and Johnson left the Buttery Bar and then they returned at about 12:25 on December 23rd.

upset, cried again. She noted that Mr. Johnson was unusually quiet and at one point went into the bathroom and vomited. He vemited twice that night, and did once in the bathroom and one outside the front door of the bar.

Both Vance and Johnson left the bar at closing. Now Colleen McManus just happens to have a brother who is a St. Paul Police Officer assigned to the Minnesota Gang Strike Force. So she calls her brother and asks him, you know, "Have you heard anything about any shootings?" She tells him what Mr. Vance told her in the bar that night.

but he wasn't yet aware of what had happened at Sabreen's in

Eventually, after he found out about the shooting,

he relayed the information that his sister told to him to the South St. Paul Police Department.

Following that night, Vance had been to the bar after that night, December 22nd, on a number of occasions. On one occasion Vance told Colleen McManus that he had spent four hundred dollars on Christmas presents for his children. Colleen found this very suspicious in light of the fact that Mr. Vance had not been employed for over a year.

While at the Buttery Bar that night on December 22nd, 2002, there was a man there by the name of Eric Griffin. He has a street name of St. Louis. Throughout this trial you are going to hear people referred to both by their given name and street names. A lot of these folks don't know each other except by their street names. Mr. Vance's street name was Florida and Mr. Johnson's street name was Stacks. So if you hear that --

MR. SHANDS: Your Honor, I am going to object at this time.

THE COURT: Why don't you approach.

MS. KEENA: I apologize, they are nicknames. The nickname for Eric Griffin is St. Louis. The nickname for Mr. Vance is Florida. And the nickname for Dominic Johnson is

Mr. Griffin was at the Buttery Bar on the night of . December 22, 2002. He arrived at approximately 10:00 p.m. and spoke with Vance after Vance got there.

Vance told him that he had just committed a robbery in South St. Paul. Vance indicated that the robbery went bad because the guy refused to give up the money and Vance fucked him up.

The investigation revealed that prior to the murder Mr. Vance and Mr. Johnson were at the Radisson Bar which is also located in downtown St. Paul. It's technically, I think, the Capitol Grill and Bar, but a lot of people refer to it as the Radisson Bar.

Melissa Stites was a bartender there. She came forward on December 23, 2002 and reported that on the night of December 22, 2002 she was working at the bar and that at approximately 8:00 p.m. Mr. Vance and Mr. Johnson were in the bar with a third individual who was later identified as John

Ms. Stites reported that while seated in the bar, the three men appeared to be very secretive and appeared to be planning something. At one point Mr. Vance told her that they were just getting their plan on.

As the men left the bar, she commented to them that tips were low that night. In response, Mr. Vance told her, "Baby, when I get back I will have a lot of money."

Melissa Stites decided to try and help in the investigation, and she did so by agreeing to go undercover in an attempt to purchase the murder weapon from Mr. Vance. On January 3, 2003, she was wired and she met with Vance first at the Buttery Bar and they later traveled to a bar called the Lap.

The conversations between she and Vance were monitored by members of the Minnesota Gang Strike Force, the South St. Paul Police Department, and a Special Agent from

During the conversation between Melissa Stites and Vance on that night, Melissa asked Vance whether he had any guns and whether he would teach her to shoot.

in response, Vance told her that he had four guns. She asked, "Well, when is the last time you used one"? In response, Vance told her "Two weeks ago, a Winchester over on the south side."

When she asked Vance what happened, he told her that he shot a guy five times in the back. She asked Vance. "Well, did you stop to see if the guy was dead?" Vance replied, "Nope, I just kept going."

You are going to hear the officers who are going to come in and testify, the officers that monitored that conversation.

During the course of the investigation, officers talk

to John Martin, who was the third individual that was at the Radisson Bar prior to the murder. They were at the bar together for approximately, what John Martin recollects, about an hour and a half.

While at the bar. Vance and Johnson told John Martin that they were going to South St. Paul that night. John Martin denies that they discussed any robbery plans in front of him, but that the two did mention -- and ignore my typo there. I just caught it -- did discuss how they were going to put two and two together to buy Christmas presents for their kids.

While at the bar, using Vance's cell phone, Vance and Johnson called who John Martin refers to, and what they are commonly referred to, as the South St. Paul Girls, Yvonne and Nicole. They called Yvonne and Nicole for a ride.

The three men then left the bar together. And John Martin was going over to his girlfriend's place, he wasn't going with Mr. Vance and Mr. Johnson that night. While he was waiting for his bus, he saw Mr. Vance and Mr. Johnson being picked up by Nicole and Yvonne in a blue Corsica.

The car was being driven by Nicole. And as the testimony will bear out, Nicole is actually Nicole Rauschnot and she did in fact own a blue Corsica at the time.

Another witness that you are going to hear from is Fabian Wilson. Fabian actually came to light through John Martin. John Martin told officers that "My half-brother Fabian

Wilson has information."

Pabian Wilson has a child in common with Mr. Yance's sister. Fabian Wilson tells officers that when he was at Shawna Vance's house one night, Mr. Vance's sister, Vance was there and they briefly talked about the homicide at Sabreen's. In the context of that conversation, Vance told Fabian Wilson that he and Dominic did it and that they gave him fives to the back of the head.

You are also going to hear testimony from Regina Haggerman. Regina Haggerman lives in St. Paul. In December of 2002, Mr. Vance was dating her niece, Darlene Jones.

The Saturday before the January 2, 2003 Super Bowl, Vance was at her house and started talking about a homicide. This was the first time Regina Haggerman ever met

In talking about it, Vance tells her that he and one of his friends killed someone. Vance told her that the police were investigating him for the murder, which he knew because by this point he has already been questioned by the police a couple times. He knows he is being investigated for the murder, but that the police had no evidence and that he had good lawyers.

He said that he committed the murder, but that nobody is going to be able to prove it. And you know what? It's true about one of the statements. The state doesn't have

any actual physical evidence. If you're looking for DNA to be all over a piece of clothing that Mr. Vance might have been wearing that night, we don't have it.

One of the things when you are looking at the evidence with the coroner, and the amount of blood, you are going to see that there wasn't a lot of blood. There was no blood splatter at this crime scene. It's one of the neatest crime scenes I've ever seen. We don't have that.

We don't have foot imprints. You know, that was one of the things why I asked you about CSI. We tried. The BCA worked their buns off. We tried to get partial prints. Nothing. So he is right about that. We don't have any physical evidence. But, by God, we got a bunch of people that he told.

Another person that he told was Tyrone Crawford. Tyrone Crawford was housed with Vance in the Sherburne County Jail for a period of time in 2003. Vance knows he is being investigated for this murder. He knows it. He can't keep his mouth shut, though.

He tells Crawford that he and another person had robbed a grocery store and shot a guy. When he tells it to Mr. Crawford, he says that the shooting was an accident and that the gun had discharged because Vance was nervous. It discharged four times. And, granted, these guys have criminal histories. You are going to hear about it. But he is telling this to a lot of different folks in a lot of different settings.

John Nunn, John Nunn and Vance were also incarcerated together at the Sherburne County Sail and again at the Sandstone Correctional Facility. And John Nunn came to us after Tyrone Crawford said, "You know, he talked to these other guys too. They were pretty close. You might want to go interview them."

So the police did. And John Nunn said, "Yeah, Vance told me he was being investigated for committing this murder at Sabreen's."

During conversations between the two, Vance told him that he had to merck somebody -- and Mr. Nunn will explain that to merck somebody means that you actually hit somebody with a builet -- and that he did it at a store and that he used a .22. Now there were .22 casings that were found at

Isaac Hodge. Isaac Hodge came to us through John Nunn. John Nunn said, "Well, if you're talking to me, you should talk to Isaac Hodge. He's my nephew. He and Vance were even closer than we were."

Mr. Hodge and Mr. Vance were incarnated at the Sherburne County Jail. In numerous conversations Vance told him -- again knowing that he was being investigated for the Sabreen's homicide -- that he had killed someone during the course of a robbery and that it wasn't worth it. That they didn't get that much money and it wasn't worth it.

Dontay Reese is another witness you're going to hear from. Dontay Reese has a criminal history, and I'll be up front with you. Dontay Reese, we found out about him through another inmate at the Dakota County Jail. And when we first approached Dontay Reese, he didn't want to talk. He wasn't saying anything against Mr. Vance.

So after having a convergation with his dad and his mom -- and I will be upfront with you, he was, and still is, being held in jail on a serious felony matter and he is going to get 36 months off of his sentence for coming in and cooperating. Sometimes it's something you have to do when you are weighing seriousness of each case.

So the defense is going to pound on that, but Dontay Reese, when you hear his testimony, it all kind of starts to fit together. Dontay Reese has known Vance and Johnson for six years. They were friends outside of jail.

They were housed together in the Dakota County Jail, and while together Vance told him, "You know, I am charged with the homicide at Sabreen's."

In conversations between the two, Vance provided the following details to Mr. Reese: On December 22, 2002, Vance and Johnson met John Martin at the Radisson Bar. While at the bar, Johnson used Vance's cell phone to call two women for a ride. Reese remembers the names as Yvonne and Nicky. He has no idea who these South St. Paul girls are. He

thought it was Yvonne and Nicky or Ricky, or something like

The two women picked Vance and Johnson up in what Reese recalls as either a blue Corsica or an Accord. He remembers it had an A in it. And he is recalling this conversation about five or six months after it actually happened.

The four meet up with a man by the name of Richard Robinson who has a nickname of Hennessy. They also meet up with a man by the name of Troy Crawford, and they meet at a residence of Robinson's girlfriend, which is located in South St. Paul. It actually is the residence of Keitha McKinney, who was dating Robinson at the time, and she only lived about a block and-a-half from Sabreen's.

Keitha McKinney is going to come in and testify. She's never met Mr. Vance. She thinks that the night that this happened she was battling -- she had hepatitis and had been hospitalized and she doesn't recall whether she was in the hospital at that time or whether she was home sick.

According to Dontay Reese, Vance told him that he, Johnson, Crawford and the two girls drove to Sabreen's and parked in the alley. Vance and Johnson entered the store while Mr. Crawford acted as a lookout in the back of the store.

While inside Sabreen's, Johnson yelled something at Vance, while Vance was behind the counter, which is consistent with what Kathleen Johnson says, that she heard

somebody yell something. It was Johnson alerting Vance that someone had entered the store.

Vance told Reese that he "gave the dude five to the back of the head, got the money, and got out of there." They then got back into the car and got dropped off at the Buttery. As to the type of weapon used, Vance said he used a deuce deuce. That's how he described it to Dontay Reese. Dontay Reese, in his mind that means a .22 pistol.

Finally, you are going to hear -- one of the witnesses you are going to hear from is Geronimo Estrada.

Geronimo Estrada, in February of 2003, was housed in the Ramsey County Workhouse with Vance and Johnson. He actually was in the same unit as Mr. Vance.

Vance told him that he was being investigated for the homicide at Sabreen's. Vance told him how it went down. He told Mr. Estrada that he and Johnson entered Sabreen's and that Vance went behind the counter. Vance described how he told the victim to get on the ground and that the victim was pleading with Vance not to hurt him. Vance stated that he laid the victim on the floor and popped him two times.

Vance told him that they were wearing Ninja masks at the time that this happened, which is consistent with what Kathleen Johnson indicated, that the two men were wearing Ninja masks.

Ninja masks are black masks that cover your

entire face. That was consistent with what Kathleen Johnson
has indicated.

Vance indicated that he threw away the shoes he was wearing the night of the homicide, and he indicated -- and this was never made public. He indicated that they got stacks of money, lottery tickets, cigarettes, a phone, and baggies. By gosh, what were they missing from the store? You know, what's Tariq Bakkri going to testify to? Those are the exact things that they were missing from the store.

So that's a brief summary of what some of the evidence that the state intends to introduce during the course of this trial.

During your questioning that you underwent to be a member of this jury, I believe I asked every one of you whether you thought you had good common sense. And each of you assured me that you did. As you listen to the facts of this case, use your common sense.

What does the evidence tell you? What does it tell your common sense? Make the reasonable conclusions of the facts that are presented to you.

At the close of this case, the state is going to ask you to apply your common sense to the facts and law that are presented to you, and is going to ask you to return guilty verdicts on all three counts that Mr. Vance is charged with.

THE COURT: Ms. Singh.

MS. SINGH: Your Honor, may it please the court, ladies and gentlemen of the jury, Mr. Vance, Ms. Keena and Mr. Shands. On December 22, 2002, Khaled Al-Bakri told his brother, "Go home, take your young family home, I will close up, it's Sunday night. It's not very busy here."

His family went and he stayed behind. Moments later, Kathleen Johnson walks into the store. She doesn't make it very far into that store. She walks into the front door, something's just not right, and she notices it right away.

She's not in there for more than a couple momenta. Remember, she sees a man behind the counter. He is dressed in all black, he's got a mask on. He's about five-seven, she says. So she turns around and walks out.

She doesn't see anybody else inside of that store.

She just sees that one man, but she notices he motions for somebody else. She knows something's wrong, so she walks

When she walks out, she gets into her car. Now mind you, moments are going by. This isn't happening at a slow pace, it's happening very quickly. She gets into her car and as she is about to drive off, she sees two people walk out of Sabreen's, outside the front door, and run through the parking lot and into the back alley.

She notices one man is small and one man is

bigger. She says their height's about five-seven for one of them and the other one about five-nine.

It's an evening, it's winter time, it's dark out, it's a residential street. But that's what she notices.

Moments later, four local teenagers are on their way to Sabreen's. It's Christmas vacation. They've got time off. They're watching movies at a friend's house, so they want to get some snacks. They're walking to Sabreen's, they're just having a good time, sliding on the ice, just having fun, not really paying attention to what's going on around them.

They see two men getting into a car. And this is the testimony that you will hear from some of these kids.

Samantha Renville and her brother Matt, they notice the car. They notice that it was a silver-grey automobile. And the size of that car is very critical. They notice it to be a full-sized car. They said it was a full-sized car.

Samantha will identify it like a Cadillac and Matthew will say it's kind of like a police-sized car, a Crown Victoria; something bigger, not that small car, a bigger car. They see the two people getting into the car. One in the front passenger seat and one in the back passenger seat.

Matthew Renville will testify they were all wearing black, baggy clothes, everything. The state told you that's what they were wearing. But that's what the kids saw. They don't think anything of it until they walk into Sabreen's. They're

having a good time, it's vacation and they don't have to worry about school the next day.

Matthew walks in, he hangs out at the counter,

while Samantha and their other young friend go get snacks.

And Dale Marx, Jr., he notices that something is amiss. He doesn't see the store owner there, the clerk, so he walks back to the cooler to see if he can find the store owner. He knows who these people are, he lives across the street.

He walks to the back, he goes to the cooler, he doesn't see anybody, doesn't see anything, so he comes back up front, and that's when he notices the register is open.

He walks behind the counter, he looks over the counter, that's when he notices Khaled Al-Bakri on the ground. He's laying on his side and he's got gunshot wounds, and there's blood. There's change strewn everywhere.

So the young Mr. Marx runs across the street to his parents' home and he says, "Something's wrong, something's wrong, call the cops." His father, not believing him, he's a young teenager, goes across the street and checks it out himself. And that's when the investigation began.

The Bureau of Criminal Apprehension is called, the coroner's office is called. They block it off with yellow tape.

The crime scene is processed. The coroner takes the body to later do an autopsy. Dr. Mohammed Sedqi, from the Bureau of Criminal Apprehension, will come in here and he will tell you

about what he did as far as the crime scene -- the crime scene things.

He will tell you how he took fingerprints, body fluids, any body fluids that they could find, they took those to process, any footprint impressions they could find in that store. And he will tell you they did find a lot of footprint impressions along with fingerprints. He will tell you this is a convenience store, there's a lot of people. He will tell you that he finds those.

He will also tell you that the other thing that they did was they processed the crime scene and they found random cigarette butts out in the parking lot, because they went as far as the parking lot and to the back alley because they knew that the individuals left from back there.

So they found cigarette butts, they took impresssions of tire tracks. They found empty soda cans, they took anything and everything they could find, because they wanted to process this crime scene to see what they could get off of it.

That same evening, on December 22, 2002, about 10:15, 10:30, Colleen McManus -- she's a night manager at the Buttery Bar in downtown St. Paul -- has a conversation with Mr. Vance.

You will learn that Mr. Vance was kicked out of the Buttery Bar because he got into a fight with somebody earlier.

A few days earlier he got kicked out of there. So he walked in,

he was a little nervous, he doesn't know if she's going to kick him out again. And Mr. Vance, being a smart fellow and realizing that, you know, maybe I could have a few drinks, he goes up to her and he does make a comment.

He talls her, "I was nervous." He says, "I shot him five times in the south side." Do not forget that. It's very, critical because you will hear that more than once.

There are other people in that bar who he had conversations with: Eric Griffin, and there's another individual in that bar. There's a person by the name of Maynard Cross, who will come in here and testify that he was there too.

Now the evening of December 22nd Ms. McManus, after having a conversation with Mr. Vance, is a little concerned. She has a right to be. She knows these people. She knows that Mr. Vance's nickname is Florida. Why is his nickname Florida? He grew up in Florida. He came to Minnesota as a teenager, and he would tell people he grew up in Florida, so they called him Florida.

Ms. McManus is a little concerned, so what does she do? She asks Mr. Vance for his phone number. He gives her his cell number. That same evening she contacts her brother, John McManus from the St. Paul Police Department. He tells her he doesn't know if there's been any shootings tonight, but he'll check on it.

And he checked on it the next day. The police

department in South St. Paul has got a suspect. On December 23rd they've got a guy in a bar who's been drinking, he made some comments to get a free drink, they got a suspect. This is what I want you to remember and pay attention to as you hear these witnesses come in and testify because this is the beginning of the police officers in South St. Paul's tunnel vision. It begins and ends with Mr. Vance and his friend, Mr. Johnson.

As the investigation proceeds, they get information from other people in the neighborhood. This is a neighborhood store. People know the people who run Sabreen's. They get information from other neighborhood people who contact the police officers and say, "Hey, there's been some rumblings going on down at such and such a place, and so and so has been saying this or that."

What do the police officers do with that information they get? Now this is a homicide investigation. Anyone and everyone should be investigated here. What do they do? They dismiss those people after five minutes of checking out that information.

You see, the eyewitnesses that were there that night, very critical here, that were there that night, cannot tell us who the people were inside of Sabreen's Supermarket. They can't tell us if they were Black, Asian, Hispanic or White. They can't tell us anything.

The only words we have that begin this process is

the words of Mr. Vance. So the South St. Paul Police Department, they've got their suspect. Now the next step here for them, instead of letting the evidence that they have collected lead them to the individual, they're going to create the evidence to get their suspect.

MS. KEENA: Objection, Your Honor.

THE COURT: It's a little argumentative.

MS. SINGH: The evidence is being collected here.

Now the evidence should lead them to the suspect. So the police officers contact Mr. Vance. They find out that he is being housed at the Ramsey County Workhouse. They contact Mr. Vance, he is in there. They interview him a couple times, and this is the consistent part of what he says to them. Every time the police officers speak to Mr. Vance he says, "I didn't do this. What do I do to clear my name? I didn't do this."

What do the police officers do? They get Melissa Stites involved as an agent for them. She becomes an undercover officer for them. She engages Mr. Vance in a conversation because, remember, they've got their suspect, so now they've got to get some evidence against him.

So they set up this operation with Melissa Stites. She goes undercover. They give her government funds to purchase a weapon from him. He'll admit it. She purchases a weapon from him. "Ding, ding, ding, we got our murder weapon, we're going ahead with this investigation." The police officers are happy, they're excited, this is going along, this is what we want.

Now this is critical. That gun that was purchased. it gets tested. It gets tested eventually and, low and behold, it doesn't match. It doesn't match to that gun.

Let's talk about the other stuff that doesn't match. Kurt Moline will come in here and he will testify about the shell casings that were found and the bullets that were found, his testing that he did.

The Bureau of Criminal Apprehension has a hundred year old method for testing guns and testing bullets, casings, and so forth. A tried and true method. This is something they have been doing for years, and that's what they're good at, and this is what they do. None of it ever matches to that gun. The only tie that actually exists to Mr. Vance, the gun, it doesn't ever match.

Now the other things that were collected. The other things that were collected that we talked about, the body fluids, any fluids they could find, fingerprints, the footprints, the cigarette butts, the empty soda can, any of that stuff that was collected at the crime scene, none of it ever matches to Mr. Vance. It never places him inside of Sabreen's on December 22nd, 2002. Why doesn't it place him in there? Because he wasn't there. He's not the one that they have, even though the tunnel vision has begun and gone.

Now let's talk about the timeline here. The investigation for the BCA, that takes time. So they didn't have their reports back for the DNA analysis and the fingerprint analysis. That took some time, so they didn't have this information back until about, I would say, probably sometime in mid 2003. This evidence tends to take time. This isn't like on TV where everything gets resolved in an hour.

It's about January - late January, early 2000, early February 2003. Police officers have got Mr. Vance in mind, so they go to speak to him, and they talk to him. And what do they say to him?

They say, "We've got evidence against you. We got the gun, we got the video surveillance from the store, and the guy was shot five times in the back of the head. We've got your fingerprints, when that stuff comes back, your DNA, everything is going to come back. It's going to match up to you." That's what they tell him. And these are trained police officers. They know it's their job to get information from people.

How do they get information from people? They give them things. They tell them things. And what did Mr. Vance say? When presented with all this evidence that they had on him, what does he say? "I didn't do this. I don't know what you're talking about. What do I do to clear my name?" He was very consistent in saying this.

Now Ms. Keena talked about a person by the name

of Geronimo Estrada. He is an individual who was in the Ramsey County Workhouse around the end of January-February, 2003. He tells the police officers in South St. Paul that he is in there with Mr. Vance and Mr. Johnson. He tells the police officers that he's engaged in a conversation with Mr. Vance and Mr. Johnson at different times.

Now one of the things that you didn't hear Ms. Keena talk about, but Mr. Geronimo Estrada will definitely testify to, is this. Mr. Estrada contacted the South St. Paul Police Department through his girlfriend. And Mr. Estrada is getting a benefit for walking into this courtroom and taking the stand.

MS. KEENA: Your Honor, objection. Could we approach?

THE COURT: Yes.

(Off record discussion at the bench) MS. SINGH: Mr. Estrada, he's in custody with Mr. Vance and Mr. Johnson. At this time Mr. Vance knows he is being investigated for a homicide in South St. Paul. He's had conversations with the police department. He's had many conversations with the police department. He knows he's being under investigation.

And, ladies and gentlemen, I am going to tell you about something. When people are in custody, when people are in jail, there's a hierarchy among people. There are some

people that are in custody for petty crimes, misdemeanors, and then there are some people that are in custody for very serious offenses

At that time, Mr. Vance was in there for something petty. But he knew that he was being looked at for something very serious. He knew that he was under investigation for a homicide. And at that time he needed to get some information. And you would be so surprised, the people in the criminal justice system, they've got a lot of knowledge. Conversations in jail, there's a lot of knowledge there. So he asks people about that

This, I want you to remember, this is very critical. because this is where it all starts. It starts with Mr. Estrada-the gravy train that becomes Mr. Vance. He's under investigation for a homicide. "Let's get this guy talking. Let's have him talk about the sun, the moon and stars, and let's have him talk about anything and everything," because we know that as soon as we contact the police department, we could use that to leverage our own case. That's what people in jail know. That anyone and everyone who walks through these doors and takes this witness stand, they either have a criminal record or convicted felons. Or, they've got something pending.

Some of them, you will hear, were given actual cash, money. Others, you will hear, will get their charges dismissed. Wow, the ultimate benefit. They don't have to

worry about going to jail. And others, as Ms. Keena spoke of. Dontay Reese, he's getting a full three years knocked off his sentence. They are getting a benefit for being here. And don't forget the other people who are getting a benefit for being here. the people that you never hear about, the people that you don't talk about, the individuals from the South St. Paul Police Department.

This crime occurred almost two years ago. This investigation has been going on for that long. It's been going on for a very long time. The number of man hours, the number of funds, the money that has gone into this, if you don't think that the South St. Paul Police Department isn't invested in coming in here and telling you about their case, then you are very mistaken because they have a vested interest.

Their vested interest does exist here. They want this case closed. They think they know who did it. But pay attention, because they really don't know who did it. Their tunnel vision took over a long time ago. They let a lot of critical leads pass them by.

Now there's another individual who's going to come in here and testify. He also was at the Buttery on December 22nd, a person by the name of Maynard Cross. Mr. Cross will be a witness. What will his testimony be?

He will testify, it's anticipated he will testify to being there and having a conversation with Mr. Vance that

same night. And he will speak of the conversation of how Mr. Vance told him about this event. Pay attention to Mr. Cross's testimony. You see, Mr. Cross, he's in prison. Why is he in prison? Because he and his associate and his girlfriend went to a store in Minneapolis and --

MS. KEENA: Can we approach?

Dr. Sedqi will come in here and testify that as part of their processing the crime scene, they found four shell casings behind the counter. These four shell casings were then matched up to three bullets. The three bullets that they were matched up to, two inside Mr. Khaled Al-Bakri, and one in a flashlight found on a shelf.

The fourth builet was never found. He will testify they did anything and everything to try to find that fourth bullet. They even used, you know, this is the BCA Crime Lab, they've got sophisticated techniques. This might be a small bullet, but this is sophisticated stuff that they deal with. They used various methods to try to locate that fourth bullet and it was never found. They even used some type of a lead component to try to detect lead inside of there and it wasn't found.

Remember that, ladies and gentlemen. Those are the numbers that are going to be very critical here. Any and all of the witnesses that come in here and testify will never say "Mr. Philip Vance told me he talked into Sabreen's on December 22nd and he shot and killed the clerk. And this is how he adid it." None of them will ever say that.

You know who else will never come in here and say anything? That phantom party. Those teenagers will testify, the Renville children and Mr. Marx, they will come in here and testify that two people got into a car, they got into the front passenger seat and the back passenger seat.

MR. SHANDS: Your Honor, I am offering the letter into evidence as a letter that was written by the witness. The witness has testified that letter is true and correct as to what he wrote down. He wrote this letter because he was offering reward money. The letter was given to us by the state.

The letter, for one, we are offering it to show that in fact the reward money was offered and who it was offered to.

Basically, I mean, the letter speaks for itself. It's our position that it's not hearsay. The witness is here, the witness is here to testify to it, and it's true and accurate for what it depicts. And that's what we are offering it for.

MS. KEENA: Your Honor, the state objects to the introduction of this letter because foundation has not been completed yet. They still have to prove that Mr. Maynard Cross actually received this letter, and it's at that time. I mean, this is the first piece of foundation they have to lay, but they have to prove that Maynard Cross actually got this letter.

This letter is being introduced for the purpose of impeaching Maynard Cross if he testifies. So until that full foundation is laid, the state objects to it in that regard. I don't have any objection to it coming in if Maynard Cross gets up and testifies and says he got it.

If the evidence does come in, the state would object to portions of the letter because it refers to the facts of Mr. Maynard Cross's underlying crime that he is currently serving time for. The court has ruled that any of that alternative perpetrator evidence, what he did, doesn't come in to evidence. So if the court allows it, that portion of it should come out.

MR. SHANDS: Your Honor, we are not offering it to impeach Mr. Cross's testimony. I am offering this letter for the sole fact that this witness, Mr. Bakkri, actually wrote the letter and sent the letter.

I have not commented on the fact that it got to Mr. Cross. I am offering it solely to show that in fact Mr. Bakkri wrote it and Mr. Bakkri sent it.

MS. KEENA: It's irrelevant. The whole letter is about Maynard Cross and what Maynard Cross might get in return for his testimony.

MR. SHANDS: That's not true, Your Honor. The letter is very relevant in that he was offering reward money. He is sending a letter out to potential witnesses, that I know of. I have a question regarding who he sent it to. I have a question in regards to if he gave it to the police officer, did they even know about it? I am assuming they did, since the state in fact gave us this letter. But for Ms. Keena to say that I am introducing it for bias and all that, I am introducing it to show that he offered reward money, he offered that money in the form of a letter. This is the letter that he wrote and sent.

MS. KEENA: Your Honor, I think -- go ahead.

THE COURT: Ms. Keena is right in one respect. If you are going to argue that Maynard Cross was influenced by an offer of a reward, he will have to testify, number one. And he will have had to have received the letter. So foundation is not complete, if that's the reason you are offering it, unless and until Maynard Cross testifies.

You can certainly ask Mr. Bakkri if he offered a reward and who he offered it to. But the letter addressed to Maynard Cross, I mean, it's addressed to a specific purpose. I didn't see an address on it. I don't know where he sent it. But the letter can't go in unless and until Cross testifies, but you can ask Mr. Bakkri who he offered rewards to.

MR. SHANDS: Okay. Subsequently if I ask him did he offer a reward, did he offer it to a specific person, why did he just send the reward to this person? There had to be a reason for it, and then offer is this the letter you sent?

THE COURT: What would the relevance be? MS. KEENA: It's not relevant unless Mr. Cross gets up and testifies.

MR. SHANDS: She can object. I think it is relevant. It's a piece of evidence that went in. He wrote it. The relevance is it's a piece of evidence that he wrote and I understand there is maybe facts that hurt the state's case, but that's the nature of what we are doing here. There are facts that are going to hurt their case. This is a letter that should get in, it's been authenticated and Ms. Keena can make her objections and I can ask questions --

the end of the gun it hits the skin, if it's close enough, and causes little red marks. That's called powder stippling or powder tattooing. Again, it's one of the things that we use when we're trying to make a determination about how far away the gun was from the body, but because of the hair and the sweater, I wouldn't see it on the skin. So I can't really say whether, you know, it would have been there, but for the hair and the sweater.

- Q Now you talked about the bullets and the angle of the bullets.
 Could you just kind of explain how they went through? Were they straight, were they angled?
- A Sure. The bullet that entered in the left side of his head went from the back to the front, very slightly to the right. It started on the left side of his head and ended on the left side of his head, but where it ended was closer to the midline. So it was slightly left to right. And then also it very slightly went up, so that it entered in the head a little bit lower than where it ended up. But basically that one went pretty much straight through, back to front.

The other one that went in on the left side of his neck went from the left side of his neck to the right side of his head, so — and also went from the back to the front, so that one went from left to right, back to front. And that one where the bullet ended up was slightly above where it went in. So again slightly up, left to right, back to front and slightly up on that one.
